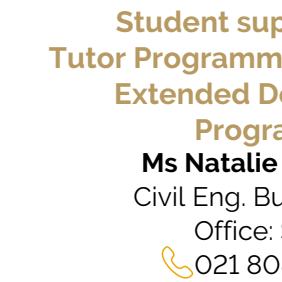

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Academic support for first-years

>> Where can I find the online SU enrolment program for prospective first-year students?

An exciting new [Welcoming Guide](#) has been launched online. This guide will orientate first-year students within their Faculty and help them prepare for their studies, as well as the unique student experience awaiting them on campus.

>> Attend all lectures and tutorials, and prepare well for tutorials

Lectures and tutorials are carefully designed to help students master the material. Make attending these sessions your top priority, and prepare thoroughly for tutorials to maximise your learning experience

>> Make an appointment to see your lecturer

If you have attempted to master certain concepts but are still struggling, schedule an appointment with your lecturer. While fellow and senior students can be helpful, your lecturer is the best source for guidance and advice

>> Group learning sessions

On most weekday afternoons, immediately after regular tutorials, visit Room A503 to prepare for the next day's tutorial. This is an opportunity to collaborate with other students in group learning sessions. Teaching assistants will also be available to provide guidance and support.

>> Dean's lecture

During weekly lectures in the first semester, the Dean or Vice-Dean will address each class group. These sessions will include advice on study methods, tracking your academic progress, and accessing additional support. Make the most of these lectures by actively listening and completing the related assignments.

>> Individual tutoring

The Faculty does not support one-on-one tutoring, as it may hinder the development of your independent learning skills. Building these skills is essential for successfully completing the BEng programme. The support structures mentioned above are designed to help you master the material while fostering the abilities you'll need for future years of study.

>> Anxiety, stress and study methods

Feeling stressed or overwhelmed is a common experience for first-year students in the BEng programme. However, if you are falling behind significantly or are too stressed to study effectively, contact **Ms Natalie White** to schedule an appointment with one of the Faculty's educational psychologists. They can help you manage stress and adjust your study methods to become more productive.

Health and safety rules at Engineering



>> No food or drinks in lecture rooms:

Snacks and cooldrinks are strictly prohibited in lecture rooms. Students may bring only unsweetened water into lecture halls.



>> Phones on silent:

Switch phones to silent before entering classrooms, labs, or tutorials.



>> No bare feet:

Wear proper footwear; bare feet and sandals are prohibited in labs and workshops.



>> Skateboards are not allowed in buildings/passages

No Skateboarding Indoors: Skateboarding is disruptive and damages floors—keep it outside.



>> Smoking and Vaping rules:

Smoking and/or vaping is banned indoors and within 20m of entrances.

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Frequently Asked Questions

>> How can I find bursary opportunities?

Bursaries are advertised on Faculty notice boards. Some may target specific fields, like Civil Engineering, and appear on the relevant Department's board. You can also get advice from the Bursary and Loans Division in Admin A or online at <https://finaid.sun.ac.za/>. The Dean and Departments do not provide additional bursary information.

>> Who can help if I'm struggling academically?

Speak to Ms Natalie White for advice. If necessary, she will refer you to the Dean. From your second year, discuss academic issues with your Departmental Chairperson.

>> Who do I contact if I feel stressed or overwhelmed?

Ms Natalie White can arrange for you to meet with one of the Faculty's educational psychologists.

>> Do I need to submit a medical certificate if I was sick?

No. If you miss lectures, it's your responsibility to catch up. Missing a tutorial test will result in a zero, but the two lowest test scores are excluded from your semester mark. If you miss A1 or A2 assessments, you must write A3. For major assignments, contact your lecturer as soon as possible.

>> Where can I find my lost items?

Lost property from the General Engineering Building is handed to Ms Ainsley Truter in room S4028, Civil Eng. Building.

>> How are lecture room numbers organised?

Room numbers indicate the building, floor, and room. For example, "A203" means the General Engineering Building ("A"), second floor ("2"), room 03. Other buildings are:

- B: Industrial
- K: Knowledge Centre
- M: Mechanical & Mechatronic
- C: Process (Chemical Engineering)
- E: Electrical & Electronic
- S: Civil

>> What are Dean's Lectures?

These lectures are part of the Intercultural Communication 113 module, held on Mondays in the first semester. During this period the Dean and Vice-Dean will convey very important information to first-year students. Attendance is mandatory as this is a credit-bearing module.

>> Where can I buy textbooks?

Textbooks can be bought from any supplier, either as hard copies or e-books. The Faculty is not responsible for transactions. You can also buy second-hand books from bookstores or senior students. [Click here](#) for supplier details.
